AMORY YOUTH IS KILLED IN CRASH

Auto in Which He Was Riding Collided with a Lumber Truck at Night

AMORY, Dec. 9—Henry Gosa, aged 21, son of Bill Gosa, who resides on the L. E. Brooks farm, four miles north of Amory, was killed instantly when a Chevrolet touring car in which young Gosa and Clyde Wright were driving, collided with a lumber truck which was being driven by Odis Adock and a negro.

It is reported that Adcock was coming to Amory from Smithville with a heavy load of lumber for the L. E. Puckett lumber yards, and owing to the fact that the heavy timbers, or the greater part of the load fell to the *.ght side of the truck, the driver was leaning to the left side on a little knoil or incline in an effort to balance his load. The approaching car was said to have failed to see his signal, or notice the position of the truck, and a collision was the result.

Young Goza was thrown through the windshield of the car in which he was riding, and his head struck the lumber on the truck, the blow being sufficient to tear through his skull. Wright was uninjured, with the exception of a few minor bruises.

The accident occurred almost directly in front of the Goza home. The body was turned over to E. E. Pickle, an Amory undertaker. Funeral services were held from the residence Thursday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock, burial following in the Hatley cemetery six miles east of Amory.

Gosa is survived by his mother, father and several sisters and brothers. He was well known in the vicinity in which he lived and was considered a young man of good character.
